
### Measuring our impact

We are constantly seeking ways to improve our work with youth. Formal evaluation is an important way to assess the impact SYVPI is having on youth violence. To get ready for evaluation, SYVPI will undertake some major new tasks in 2015 that include:

- 1. Updating our community assessment of youth violence to ensure we are focusing on the youth we can best impact.
- 2. Making sure we have the right outcome measures.
- 3. Identifying the most appropriate evaluation methods.
- 4. Ensuring that our data collection system and methods are strong.
- 5. Continuing to use and test our risk assessment screening tool to monitor youth progress.

We are encouraged by the data we've been tracking on youth violence in the neighborhoods and among the youth population we serve.

#### Investing in youth pays off in safe lives

We are grateful to the Mayor, City Council and the taxpayers of Seattle for supporting the Seattle Youth Violence Prevention Initiative. In 2014, 89 percent of our \$5.6 million budget went directly to serve at-risk youth, with only 11 percent dedicated to administration, management and related costs.

Juvenile court referrals for violence are down by 49% in the SYVPI-served neighborhoods a reduction of almost half since SYVPI began.

SYVPI is not reporting on middle school disciplinary actions for violence while the school district remains under investigation by the U.S. Department of Education for disproportionate discipline of students of color.

## Turning my life around, one opportunity at a time

At a young age, I witnessed and experienced a lot of violence. I grew up around gang bangers and this soon became a way of life for me. They were my role models. They looked out for me by putting money in my pocket and clothes on my back.

By the age of 17, I had lost more than a dozen people to gun violence. I was devastated when my stepfather was killed. It made me think about changing my life.

This change came sooner than I thought when two of my younger brothers were shot inches away from me. This was definitely a wake-up call and I decided something had to change.

A Seattle Youth Violence Prevention Initiative outreach worker connected me to the Southeast Network at Rainier Vista Boys and Girls Club. They offered me a job and immediately engaged me with programs and opportunities. They embraced me and became my second family. They supported me through my challenges and celebrated my successes.

Now I am a member of SYVPI's SE Network Youth Action Team and use my leadership to provide the kind of positive influence I never had growing up and to give back to my community. I was chosen to represent Seattle at a conference in New Orleans where leaders from all over the country gathered to talk about what we can do to end black male homicide.

Today, I am hopeful about my future. I have a full time job and I am one test away from completing my GED. I have become the change that I want to see in my community.
